Background summary:

WDFW and the Point Elliott Treaty Tribes are working with the community to improve elk management in the Skagit and Acme Valley. The agricultural community is economically impacted by elk. While some in the agricultural community are interested in limiting the number of elk on the Valley floor, many residents are concerned with increased hunting and hazing. The Co-managers are working with the community to develop new approaches to this long standing problem in a way that works for all involved.

Staff recommendation:

Staff will provide an action plan that will outline recommendations for the coming year.

Policy issue(s) and expected outcome:

Discussion and approval of the action plan.

Fiscal impacts of agency implementation:

The 2019-2021 budget includes funding to address the elk issues in the Skagit and Acme Valley.

Public involvement process used and what you learned:

WDFW staff hosted multiple meetings with the agricultural community over the last 18 months. Staff have also presented to the Skagit County Commission several times over the last year. In addition, staff have participated in tours of elk impacts with the agricultural community. Key lessons learned:

- Agriculture is being impacted economically by elk impacts
- There is broad concern that elk collisions are on the rise along Hwy 20
- Past efforts by WDFW to resolve the issue have not been adequate
- Significant investments in fencing and hazing have helped many but not all farmers

Action requested and/or proposed next steps:


