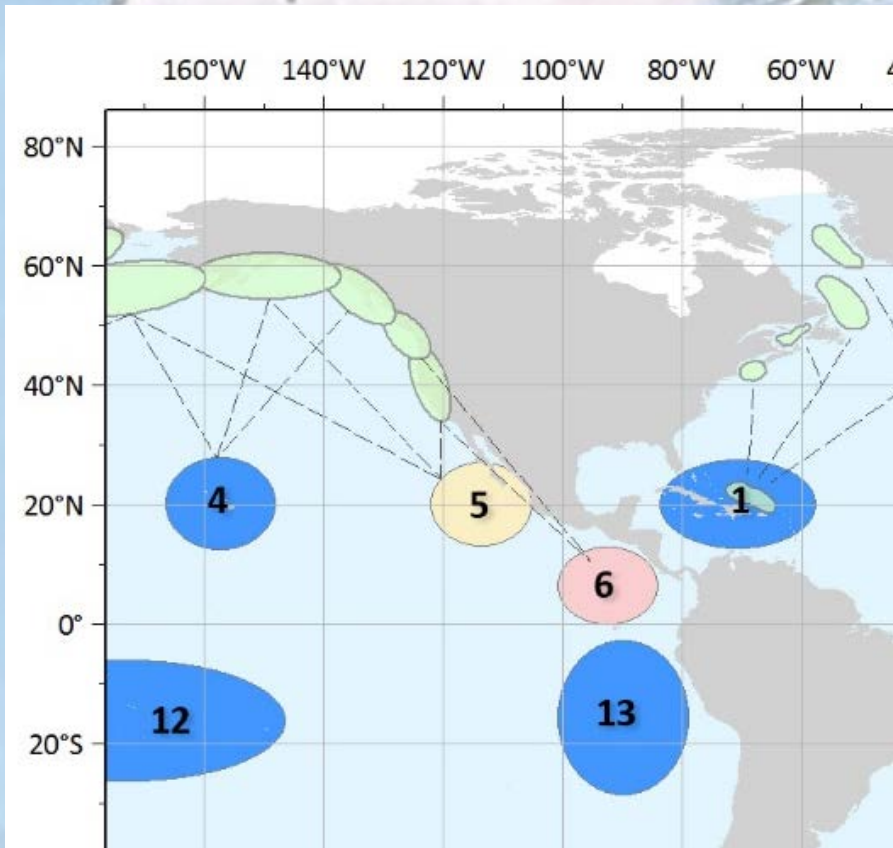


Listing Process Guided by WAC 220-610-110

- Periodic review of status every 5 years –First Periodic Status Review for Gray and Humpback Whale
- Listing recommendations and decisions “...solely on the basis of the biological status of the species being considered, based on the preponderance of scientific data available.”
- Diversity Division drafted and solicited 90 public
- Seeking decisions on status recommendations for both Humpback and Gray Whale



Humpback Whale in Washington: Recommend maintain as Endangered



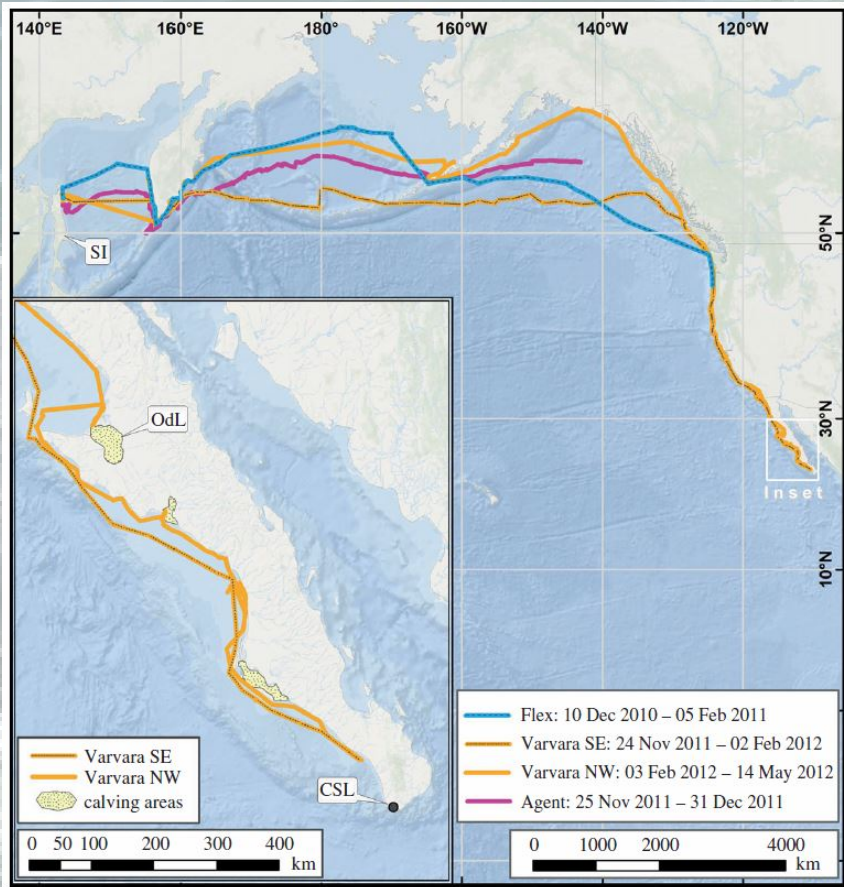
Three Distinct Population Segments use WA waters:

- Anywhere from ~36 to ~79% of Humpbacks in WA waters are from federally listed stocks (Central America DPS, and Mexico DPS)
- Others part of Hawaiian DPS (not federally listed) make up between 21% and 64% depending on the source

Threats include entanglement, ship strike, and human generated noise. Migrate to WA to feed, though more info needed on numbers coming to WA



Gray Whale in Washington: Recommend maintain as Sensitive



- Gray Whale stock structure is poorly understood
 - Eastern North Pacific (not federally listed)
 - Western North Pacific (federally endangered)
- Recent data indicates a relatively large percentage of WNP whales travel through WA waters (provisional data)
 - However a tiny fraction of the total whales in WA waters
- Continuing unusual mortality event which began in 2019, low calving numbers



Public Comment and Recommendations

- Humpback
 - Periodic Status Review: 2 letters supporting
 - Commission meeting: 1 supporting, 1 neutral
 - Updated the PSR to include the most up to date population, stranding, and threats information
 - Recommend maintain current classification as state Endangered
- Gray
 - Periodic Status Review: 2 letters supporting
 - Commission meeting: 2 supporting recommendation to maintain at a minimum, 1 neutral
 - Updated the PSR to include up to date population and movement data, UME and threats information as well as additional information on the “sounders” and other regional priorities.
 - Recommend maintain current classification as state Sensitive
