> They announced that their nest building class would be held the next morning, and flitted through the forest inviting all the other birds to come and learn.




It was now time to make the nest comfortable for herself and her eggs. She added some feathers she found, along with some dry grass and dry moss to make her nest nice and soft to sit in.






Hummingbird decided to stop in to see Robin's nest.
