



Wildfire Impact to Wildlife Areas









Rimrock Retreat Fire

• Fire area: 45,601 acres across all ownerships.

Oak Creek Wildlife Area impact: 19,040 acres.

 Location: Both sides of U.S. Highway 12 & Tieton River Corridor



Retreat Fire - Elk Fencing

- Temporary fixes to get through this winter - mostly complete.
- Permitting and surveys to for replacement.
- Fencing contract replace wood with steel posts.

Retreat Fire - Dozer line restoration

 Dozer line needs reseeding since new weed growth is expected in fire-impacted shrub steppe habitat.

- Seed was purchased for reseeding six miles of dozer line, and staff are in the process of reseeding this month.
- Spring 2025: increase spraying of noxious weeds by contractors in fire-affected areas





Retreat Fire – Restoration planting

- This photo represents a snapshot of the area to be planted with forest seedlings (foreground).
- 21,980 trees are on order to be planted spring of 2025.
- Planting density will be approximately 100 trees per acre across 220 acres.

Wenas Wildlife Area - Black Canyon Fire

Approximately 9,900 acres burned

Work Completed

- Cultural Clearance for shrub planting, native grass seeding, weed control, and temporary fix to damaged elk fence with t-posts.
- Purchased t-posts to prop up elk fence and completed temporary fix to get through winter 24-25.
- Purchased all native species needs for planting.





Black Canyon Fire Restoration work completed

 60 acres Reseeded McCabe Restoration site.

 Seeded approximately 18 miles of dozer lines.

 Planted 5210 native shrubs (over 3000 were sagebrush).



Black Canyon Fire - Ongoing work

Cultural Clearance is planned to be contracted out for approximately 1.5 miles of rebuild for damaged elk fence.





Black Canyon Fire - Work planned for 2025

 Purchase of herbicide & Aerial spraying of ~600 acres.




River Access Area





Vernita Bridge access area changes

- Very popular river access for the Hanford Reach fall Chinook fishery.
- Access site is owned by Dept. Of Energy and managed by WDFW.
- Primary use is September & October for fishery
- Amount of use became unsustainable.





Vernita - Addressing the issues

- Primitive launch area hazardous especially during low water.
- RCO planning grant received in 2022.
- Columbia River Tribes and DOE environmental impacts concerns.
- Shoreline vegetation was impacted by recreational use.
- WDFW restricted launch sites, parking,
 & camping in 2024.
- Camping phase out after fall 2025
 Chinook season.

Vernita – 2024 results

- Parking, launching & camping restrictions protected sensitive shoreline habitats.
- Compliance was high and people adapted well to the situation.
- Fishing guides were generous and helpful.
- Signage and boundary modifications in 2025 season to increase compliance.



Vernita - Next steps

- Identify new camping site
- Transition to a day-use only area by 2026 with a developed boat launch, designated parking area, and restroom.
- Continue planning, environmental review, permitting, design, & implementation





Vernita - Next steps

- Collect public input as part of the planning and permitting process.
- Continue to provide public river access.
- Apply for an RCO development grant during 2026
- If successful, fund ramp development during 2027.

KCT - Cooperative agreement with Suncadia

- Cooperative agreement between WDFW, Yakama Nation, and Trendwest Resorts (now Suncadia) signed on Dec. 4, 2000.
- Articles of Incorporation of Kittitas Conservation Trust filed on June 19, 2002.
- Kittitas Conservation Trust created to manage and steward conservation easements and mitigate onsite and offsite development impacts in the upper Yakima River watershed.
- Cle Elum River corridor easement finalized on Sep. 2, 2004.
- Bullfrog Urban Growth Area (UGA) Managed Open Space Easement finalized on Jan. 16, 2007.
- Natural and managed open space easements finalized on Dec. 11, 2015.



KCT- Purpose, Vision, Mission



Kittitas Conservation Trust

Purpose – "Ensure no net loss of fish and wildlife habitat."

Vision – "KCT envisions an Upper Yakima River Basin Community with dynamic ecosystems that sustain diverse habitats shared by all creatures as a part of a broader network of watersheds."

Mission – "Protect and enhance fish and wildlife habitat in the Upper Yakima Watershed"
