What is 'social media'?

- Internet-based technologies that enable instant communication and interaction among users:
 - Social networks such as Facebook
 - Micro-blogs such as Twitter
 - Video sharing such as YouTube
 - Audio sharing such as Podcasts
 - Photo sharing such as Flickr
- Social media offer more opportunities to use content we already produce

Why do we use social media?

- To reach more and different people than is possible through traditional communication channels
- To enhance our communication with technology that permits real-time interaction with – and among – our "customers"
- 3. To provide the department and the public with another way to communicate with each other
- To further our commitment to openness and transparency

By the numbers

Social media

- 7,000 Facebook "likes"
- 250 Facebook page views per day (773 on Sept. 28)
- 4,300 Twitter subscribers
- 400 YouTube subscribers

Email distribution

- 17,000 subscribers receive all of our information
- 10,000 receive news releases and Weekender


Website – averages


- 19,500 visits per day
- 72,000 "page views" per day




Video-sharing with YouTube

- Initiated in October 2006
 - Primarily to expand the reach of "Wild About Washington"
- Current uses
 - Clips from Wild Watch Cams
 - Clips from motion-triggered cameras from field research
 - How-to videos
- As of November 2012
 - 150 video posts (averages two per month)
 - 700,000 views since inception
 - 400 subscribers









Micro-blogging with Twitter

- Used since May 2009
- "Tweets" of 140 characters maximum sent to subscribers who can "re-tweet" to others, and/or reply to us with comments
- WDFW tweets are mostly leads from news releases, fishing rule changes and Weekender recreation reports
- As of November 2012:
 - 1,026 tweets (average of one per day since May 2009)
 - 4,300 subscribers







Social networking with Facebook


- Since June 2010
- Post photos and text to WDFW Facebook "wall" daily, with links to website for more detailed information
- "Fans" or followers can "like" (thumbs up), comment about or share posts with their Facebook friends
- As of November 2012
 - About 7,000 "likes" or unique fans
 - Those fans have nearly 1.8 million Facebook "friends"
 - If our fans contact all of their friends...


Who are our Facebook fans?





Spokane area Fish and Wildlife Police Officers are investigating the poaching of a cow moose near the top of Beacon Hill, an area popular with hikers and mountain bikers, near Valley Spring Road and Minnehaha Park.

The moose is thought to have been killed sometime during the evening of April 9, 2012. It appears to have been butchered on site and then removed from the area by vehicle during the early morning hours of April 10th.

UPDATE TO THE BEACON HILL (SPOKANE) MOOSE POACHING:

Thanks to an anonymous tip, WDFW and Washington DOC Officers identified and interviewed several individuals on April 17th regarding the cow moose poached in the Beacon Hill area of Spokane on April 10th. During the course of the investigation, 95 packages of moose meat, the archery equipment used in the poaching of the moose, and multiple evidentiary items were recovered. In addition, a search warrant was obtained and served for the seizure and forfeiture of the vehicle used to transport the poached moose.

As of right now, two individuals will be facing multiple big game charges for both the moose and an additional poached deer discovered during the investigation. Officer Mosman and Officer Spurbeck wish to thank the many citizens who called in and provided information on this case. :)

CALL FOR PUBLIC ASSISTANCE - SPREE KILLING: Spokane Fish & Wildlife Officers are seeking information about a spree killing that occurred just over a week ago near the intersection of Farwell and Peck Road. Officers received a report of people spotlighting at approximately 0100 hours on September 28th. During the spree, five white tailed deer were killed. It appeared that two of the deer, which were fawns, were intentionally run over. All five animals were left to waste.

Anyone with information about this crime is encouraged to call the Spokane Regional WDFW Office at 509-892-1001 and ask for Officer Jason Snyder. Information can also be called in to the WDFW Poaching Hotline at 877-933-9847, or texted to TIP411. In partnership with Conservation Northwest, persons providing information that leads to the arrest of the individual(s) responsible for these poachings may be eligible for a reward of up to \$2,500. Those who provide information may remain anonymous.

Enforcement: What We Have Achieved

Prevention

- Information about laws, rules, regulations, emergency closures, etc.
- Fostering community policing mentality
- Recognition of officer presence

Investigation

- Receive crime tips, solicited and unsolicited
- Offer rewards/incentives for information received
- Provide follow-up information on cases
- Public feels like partners in solving crimes

Recruitment/Hiring

- Increased interest
- Better understanding of hiring process, minimum requirements, etc.
