

Current Practices

- Majority of common prospecting methods permitted (with conditions) under the Gold and Fish pamphlet
- Extent of prospecting unknown
 no application required
- Since 2014, WDFW has issued 244 HPAs for exceptions to pamphlet
 - Only 3 of these issued to out-ofstate applicants



Regulations in Other States

- California
 - Statutory moratorium on suction dredging
- Oregon
 - Suction dredging prohibited in **Essential Salmonid Habitat**
- Idaho
 - Suction dredging prohibited in certain waters
 - Wild and Scenic Rivers
 - Critical Habitat under ESA
 - Withdrawn River Segments
 - State Protected Rivers
 - Sediment Impaired Streams



Enforceability

- Violations of Hydraulic Code or Rules
 - Gross misdemeanor
 - Up to \$5,000 fine
 - 1 year in jail
 - Civil penalty
 - \$100/day
- Enforcement patrols
- Notification of work required in some HPAs



Threat of Aquatic Invasive Species

- Prospectors move equipment throughout the state
- No provisions currently in mineral prospecting rules addressing aquatic invasive species
- Equipment cleaning provisions sometimes included in individual HPAs



Rulemaking Options

- 1. No change to existing rules
- Revise rules after reconsidering which prospecting methods to regulate under the Gold and Fish pamphlet and which require individual HPAs for approval
- 3. Revise rules to require individual HPAs for suction dredging
- Revise rules to require individual HPAs for motorized methods
- 5. Revise rules to require individual HPAs for all methods that are not "small scale mineral prospecting and mining"

Rulemaking Timeline

- File CR-101 upon completion of current Hydraulic Code rulemaking
- Timeline dependent on:
 - Method and extent of stakeholder engagement
 - Which prospecting methods require individual HPAs
 - Whether EIS, SBEIS, Cost/Benefit Analysis require extensive development
